Twelfth Annual Meeting

The New York Botanical Garden, Bronx, New York

Wednesday, October 1, 1980. New York Botanical Garden, Bronx, New York

Bob Long, librarian of the New York Botanical Garden, welcomed CBHL members and introduced Dr. James Hester, the new president of the New York Botanical Garden. After Dr. Hester's brief remarks, Ina Vrugtman, librarian of the Royal Botanical Gardens, Hamilton, Ontario, and president of CBHL, called for reports from the CBHL secretariat. Marjorie Dickinson, secretary, asked for and received approval of the minutes of the 1979 annual meeting held at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum which were published in the CBHL Newsletter of July 1979.

John Reed, treasurer, presented the financial statement for the 1979 calendar year, which is appended to these minutes. It shows a balance as of December 31, 1979, of \$6,199.24. Bernadette Callery, junior member of the secretariat, announced that 29 individuals and nine institutions have become members of CBHL since the last meeting. As of September 1980, CBHL has 109 individual memberships and 50 institutional. Apparently, many of the new members were added in response to informational mailings enclosed in the book catalogues of Elisabeth Woodburn, Booknoll Farm, Hopewell, New Jersey, and the Pomona Book Exchange, Rockton, Ontario.

Mrs. Vrugtman then introduced Ray Desmond of the India Office in London who was attending the conference as a guest. She also announced that Mrs. Elizabeth K. Reilley from Planting Fields Arboretum had prepared a special exhibit, "Water in the Garden," which was on display for the annual meeting in the library of the New York Botanical Garden. Mrs. Reilley was also responsible for the excellent catalogue of the exhibition.

Continuing the reports of standing committees, Bernadette Callery announced that three issues of the Newsletter had been published since the last meeting; she asked for discussion of the proposed new membership directory which she will edit. A number of suggestions were made by members including Joan DeFato who suggested that the directory should list strengths of the library; Ina Vrugtman that unusual periodical materials should be noted; Albert Strickland that it should note membership in consortia; Ruth Schallert pointed out the value of indexes; and Dr. Emanuel Rudolph thought that listing policies and facilities for visitors would be helpful. Ms. Callery said she would like to include information on private collections if persons with those collections would like them included. She plans to include a questionnaire in the next Newsletter and hope to have the directory finished by the next annual meeting. CBHL will reproduce and mail the completed membership directory to members. Mary Lou Wolfe and Enola Teeter volunteered to serve on the committee. (Editor's note: The directory questionnaire will be forthcoming.)

John Reed then led a brief discussion of duplicate lists. There was some consideration of the pricing of materials. John Reed pointed out that the New York Botanical Garden tries to make available to CBHL members publications at a price which just covers staff time and postage. They are interested in moving duplicate material. Bob Long explained a recent problem with a New York Botanical Garden list which had to be recalled because of a clerical pricing error. Ina Vrugtman mentioned difficulties Canadian libraries have with postage problems. She noted that her institution had recently prepared a large order and then discovered that the recipient was unwilling to pay for postage.

Marjorie Dickinson asked, for a member who was unable to attend the conference, about experiences with duplicate lists of minor periodicals. Members were very enthusiastic about such lists both from the point of view of being able to receive missing issues and runs of periodicals which they did not have, and of success in disposing of surplus material.

Reporting on CBHL bibliographies, Bob Long said none had been published during the past year. However, an orchid bibliography is scheduled to appear in the near future. He also asked for manuscripts or ideas for bibliographies to be published. In response to a question from Richard Isaacson, he stated that, of those published, most have been sold. Perhaps 20 copies remain of each printing of 500.

The Council, led by Ina Vrugtman, then turned to a discussion of CBHL-sponsored awards and grants. Mrs. Vrugtman presented a letter from Mea Allen, who is currently working on a biography of William Robinson, requesting financial assistance from the Council. In connection with this request, a discussion of the Oberly Award, which had been tabled at the Minnesota meeting, was brought up again. This award, the Eunice Rockwell Oberly Award in agricultural bibliography, is administered by the Agricultural and Biological Section of the Association of College and Research Libraries of the American Library Association and is presented every other year. Friends of NAL have contributed to the award; and it was suggested that CBHL should also contribute since this is in our area of interest. After some discussion, a motion was made that CBHL contribute \$100 on a biennial basis to the Oberly Award. The motion passed.

There was general agreement that CBHL funds be used to support Council projects, not to finance research grants.

Mary Lou Wolfe of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society suggested that Ms. Allen be informed that CBHL has no research grants available and suggested the Foundation Library, Foundation Center, 888 - 7th Avenue, New York, New York 10019, (212) 975-1120, as a source of information on grants.

Jayne MacLean of the National Agricultural Library then presented the report of the Nursery and Seed Trade Catalogue Committee. Ms. MacLean has recently taken over this committee following Barbara Emerson's resignation. Summarizing the work already done, she reported that 179 institutions have been located with holdings from one to thousands of catalogues, some areas of the United States and Canada have been well covered. Some haven't been covered at all. There are also scattered reports from a number of regions. In trying to compile a summary of work-to-date, Ms. MacLean found that a standard form for the report to her committee would have been helpful. She feels that the survey is about one-half completed now. Some areas such as the Enola Jane Teeter's report from Maryland, June Rogier's 70-page printed report on the upper midwest, Richard Isaacson's report on northern Ohio, Doug Richey's on Illinois, and Ina Vrugtman's on Ontario have been well covered. Nothing much has been done in the south. After further discussion, Richard

Isaacson asked if a first-step directory could be prepared in the next six months from material already collected. Jayne thought this was possible. John Reed asked if a small grant for secretarial help would be helpful in compiling this. She thought it would be and asked that everyone who is currently working on regional questionnaires get their material to her by February 1, 1981. From this information she will compile an initial directory which she hopes to have ready for the 1981 meeting. Possible financial aid for the project will be considered by the Secretariat if needed.

John Reed, treasurer of CBHL, asked for financial advice or advisors to help him in investing CBHL's rather healthy balance. At present, the money is in a straight checking account. He was authorized to look into possible alternatives.

Mrs. Vrugtman then asked for announcements from the members. Richard Isaacson mentioned the exhibition of 18th and 19th century prints sponsored by the Vixseboxse Art Galleries of Cleveland with a catalogue by Dr. Robert Getscher. This exhibition, at John Carroll University in Cleveland, is scheduled for September 26 through October 17, 1980. A catalogue will be available for \$6.50 from the Vixseboxse Art Galleries, 12413 Cedar Road, Cleveland Heights, Ohio 44106. Mr. Isaacson also announced that he is continuing to index new titles for his Flowering plant index of illustration and information and would like suggestions for sources of color illustrations of flowering plants. It is expected that a supplement will be published.

Bob Long mentioned the outstanding exhibition of botanical art at the Morgan Library and the activities at the International Antiquarian Book Fair.

In response to a question about interlibrary loans between members of CBHL, there was general agreement that loans are done on an informal basis. However, most loans are expedited when you know the librarian.

Jane Gates asked if travel aid has been given to members of CBHL who have difficulties in traveling to meetings; this has not been done in the past.

Marjorie Dickinson then reported on the election of the new member of the secretariat, Solange G. Gignac, librarian of the Denver Botanic Gardens. Ballots were received from 21 of the United States (including Alaska and Hawaii!) two Canadian provinces, West Germany, Australia, France, England, and El Salvador. The result was a tie vote between Ms. Gignac and Bob Long of the New York Botanical Garden which was resolved by flipping a coin.

The next meeting of CBHL will be May 5 through 8, 1981, at the Strybing Arboretum in San Francisco. There will be a joint meeting with the American Association of Botanical Gardens and Arboretums on May 5th when Ian MacPhail of the Morton Arboretum and Bob Long of the New York Botanical Garden will attempt to raise the consciousness of AABGA members about CBHL.

At this point, Ina Vrugtman thanked Bob Long, John Reed, and their staffs for the fine arrangements for the New York meeting. She then introduced Jim Reed, who will serve as CBHL president until the next annual meeting. Jim thanked Ina for her long stint as president of CBHL and adjourned the annual business meeting.

It is perhaps interesting to note that 72 persons were registered for the New York meeting. This was by far our largest conference.

Exhibitions

Hunt Institute Exhibitions

The current exhibition at the Hunt Institute is a selection of watercolors, drawings, published works and correspondence by the Victorian artist Kate Greenaway, from the private collection of Miss Frances Hooper, recently given to the Institute. The show presents an unusual view of the artist, emphasizing her views on art, its theory, practice and means to a reasonable livelihood, and focuses on her life-long interest in flowers and flower painting. Many of the watercolors shown are the originals for illustrations on her Marigold garden, Language of flowers, and almanack series. Two of the Marigold garden watercolors are accompanied by their woodblock suites prepared under the direction of Edmund Evans for the published work. An illustrated, annotated catalogue of the exhibition will include essays by Miss Hooper and Rodney Engen, a frequent writer on Victorian illustrators. Additional reproductions of the watercolors are available in the form of the poster of the exhibition and note cards.

The Spring 1981 art exhibition at the Hunt Institute will be a collection of decorative flower and fruit arrangements. The exhibition, drawn from the Institute's own collection, will be a selection of watercolors, drawings and prints representing the period from the seventeenth century to the present. The artists will include Jean-Baptiste Monnoyer, Jean-Louis Prévost, Gerrit van Spaendonck, Jan van Huysum and Pierre-Joseph Redouté. An exhibition of drawings of bristlecone pines by Della Taylor Hoss will run concurrently. Both exhibitions will be on display from March 30 through June 5, 1981 at the Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation, Pittsburgh, PA.

Lawrence Memorial Award

Nominations for Lawrence Memorial Award

The Award Committee of the George H. M. Lawrence Memorial Fund solicits nominations for the 1981 Lawrence Memorial Award. The Fund and Award have been established on a permanent basis to honor the memory of Dr. Lawrence, founding Director of the Hunt Institute for Botanical Documentation at Carnegie-Mellon University. The purpose of the Award is to support travel for doctoral dissertation research in systematic botany or

horticulture, or their history, including literature and exploration. It is expected that the 1981 Award will amount to \$1,000, which will be available to the recipient for expenditure during the two-year period from date of award. Award funds will not be applicable to research travel accomplished prior to the date of award.

Major professors and other relevant faculty are urged to submit letters of nomination for outstanding doctoral students who have achieved official candidacy for their degrees, will be conducting dissertation research in one of the above fields during the coming two years, and whose work would benefit significantly from the travel the Award would allow. The Committee will consider nominations only -- no direct applications will be entertained. A potential candidate who wishes to be considered should request his/her major professor to submit a nomination in his/her behalf. This may take the form of a letter of nomination and endorsement which covers supporting materials prepared by the candidate.

A nomination (or supporting materials) should describe briefly but clearly the candidate's program of research and how the travel enabled by the Award would contribute significantly to its quality. Letters of nomination, together with any supporting materials, should be received by the Committee no later than 1 May 1981. The awardee will be selected and the decision announced by 1 June 1981. ESTC Appeal

The Eighteenth-Century Short Title Catalogue (ESTC) is an international bibliographical project creating a machine-readable data base of all books and other miscellaneous items printed in Great Britain and its colonies during the eighteenth century and those printed in English anywhere else in the world during the same time period. All fields of study -- language, literature, history, the sciences, and the book trade -- will benefit, as students of the eighteenth century, with the help of the Catalogue, will be able to research and publish on a scale and of a quality that would otherwise be impossible. The project's headquarters are at the British Library in London where Robin C. Alston is the ESTC General Editor. The project has a North American center at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge (ESTC/NA) and is coordinating its work with the North American Imprints Program (NAIP) at the American Antiquarian Society in Worcester, MA.

The ESTC/NA has been awarded \$440,849 from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Mellon Foundation. Its editor and director is Henry L. Snyder, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at LSU. The assistant director is Judith C. Singleton. The staff is soliciting American and Canadian libraries for records of eighteenth-century items within the scope of the ESTC, with the exception of American imprints, which are being handled by the NAIP staff. Libraries' records are compared against a master file being created by the British Library from its approximately 160,000 relevant eighteenth-century holdings. For a title that matches to an entry in the master file, the ESTC staff adds its library's location symbol to the data base; for a title not in the file, the staff creates a new bibliographical entry. A microfiche edition of the British Library master file will be available in 1982. The expanded file with new entries and locations of copies of titles (estimated to be several million) will be available in 1986 on microfiche as well as through a national on-line data base.

The Catalogue will give bibliographical detail for each title and the location of copies. It will include books as well as advertisements, ballads, proclamations, public

notices, catalogs, and handbills. The ESTC will revolutionize eighteenth-century scholarship. Librarians, book collectors, book dealers, and scholars will have at their fingertips new locations of copies of titles and materials heretofore unknown to them. They will be able to access titles through a variety of means -- author, title, place and/or date of publication, publisher, book seller, printer, or keyword -- adaptable to their specific interests.
