MINUTES OF THE CBHL BOARD MEETING THE MORTON ARBORETUM, LISLE, ILLINOIS, SEPTEMBER 7, 1976

The Board of the Council on Botanical and Horticultural Libraries met at The Morton Arboretum on September 7, 1976. Attending this meeting were: Ian MacPhail, The Morton Arboretum, president, Richard Isaacson, Garden Center of Greater Cleveland, Barbara Emerson, Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, and Marjorie Dickinson, Kingwood Center, secretary. John Reed, New York Botanical Garden, treasurer, was unable to attend. Joining Board Members to discuss the 1977 Annual Meeting were: Laura Parker, reference librarian and Thelma McComb, public relations coordinator at The Morton Arboretum, and Wilma Wierwell, librarian and Barbara B. Pesch, director of education of the Chicago Horticultural Society Botanic Garden.

Items on an agenda presented by Mr. MacPhail were discussed.

Barbara Emerson, membership chairman, asked for information to help with a short article she is doing for <u>Hort Science</u> on the Council. Members were again reminded that personal involvement is the best way to recruit new members. A rather widespread mailing by Richard Isaacson to persons and institutions listed in the A.A.B.G.A. directory and other sources brought no response.

Richard Isaacson reported that 23 libraries have replied to the questionnaire on union lists which include the holdings of CBHL members. Mr. Isaacson commented that only two libraries responding so far contribute to a computer data base. The Committee on the Union List of Serials plans to meet after the first of the year to edit a union list of information sources listing CBHL members. This list is promised for April 1st.

Then turning to new business presented by Ian MacPhail, the Board approved the payment to Phyllis Edwards of a cost overrun of \$50.00 for the London meeting. The overrun was caused by the unexpectedly high travel expenses of one speaker.

Mr. MacPhail read a letter from Keith Roe of Penn State, proposing that CBHL publish the proposed union seed catalog list in microfiche format as has been done by the American Horticultural Society in their Plant Records Inventory. The Board agreed that this proposal should be very seriously considered by the membership at the next annual meeting.

A letter from Elizabeth Woodburn to Mr. MacPhail announced that she had met with Charles van Ravenswaay, Julie Morris and Mary Lou Wolfe (Ms. Morris' successor at Pennsylvania Horticultural Society's Library) to discuss the seed catalog project. Ms. Wolfe and P.H.S. intend to go ahead with the pilot project.

Mr. MacPhail has responded to a request from the <u>American Library Directory</u> for information on CBHL. He has also accepted the invitation of the Denver Botanic Gardens to meet there in June 1978.

Turning to a discussion of the 1977 Annual Meeting, Laura Parker announced that the conference theme will be 'Rare Book Conservation and Disaster Preparation.' Guest experts will speak on these topics and there will be a panel discussion, featuring CBHL members, on what is currently being done. Meetings and tours will be held at The Morton Arboretum, the Chicago Botanic Garden and at the headquarters hotel, Hyatt House in Oakbrook. Details concerning the conference which is set for April 27th - April 30th will be forthcoming in the CBHL Newsletter.

Ian MacPhail then reported for the Committee on British guests (I. MacPhail, E. Woodburn, and J. Reed). After some discussion, it was decided to invite Phyllis Edwards of the British Museum (Natural History) to come as a guest of CBHL to the 1977 meeting. If she is unable to come to Chicago, she will be invited to attend the 1978 meeting in Denver.

CBHL representatives also enjoyed a brief tour of the Arboretum's prairie by its creator, Ray Schulenberg, and had a fleeting glimpse of other parts of the Arboretum. The tea room with its fine view of the lagoon (somewhat reduced by the mid-western drought) was a lovely setting for lunch. Visiting Board Members returned home thinking perhaps of the sign in Ian MacPhail's office.

WILD FLOWERS AND TITLE PAGES - FALL EXHIBIT AT HUNT INSTITUTE

Opening on November 1, 1976, the fall exhibition at the Hunt Institute includes two separate shows, one a collection of watercolors of North American plants done for the National Geographic Society by Mary E. Eaton, the other a display of title pages from the Hunt Botanical Library's collection. "Incipit: Botanical Title Pages" traces the development of the title page through a presentation of topically and technically interesting title pages from the fifteenth through nineteenth century. "American Wild Flowers; National Geographic Society Illustrations by Mary E. Eaton" consists of 160 plant portraits selected from the many botanical illustrations done from 1911 to 1932, when the English-born artist was the New York Botanical Garden's staff artist. Continuing on exhibit will be the complete sets of the Furber prints, the Twelve Months of Flowers and the Twelve Months of Fruits.

All this will be on display at the Hunt Institute at Carnegie-Mellon University from November 1, 1976 through March 25, 1977.

NEWS FROM THE BROOKLYN BOTANIC GARDEN

The Brooklyn Botanic Garden announces the availability of four of its award-winning films for purchase or rental. The films include: "Bonsai - the Art of Training Dwarfed Potted Trees," "Pruning Practices at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden," "Planting and Transplanting," and "Nature's Colors - the Craft of Dyeing With Plants." From October 23rd through November 21st, the Garden will hold its annual Chrysanthemum Show. More than 300 chrysanthemum plants will be featured, representing over 42 varieties of the large greenhouse football type mum and over 30 varieties of the bush-type or low multi-stemmed mum. All plants will be identified.

The Garden also announces the re-opening of the Ryoanji Temple Stone Garden (a replica of the 500-year-old Zen Temple Garden to Kyoto), the Roji Garden and the Tallma Memorial Dwarf Plant Garden. The three garden complex had been closed for the better part of the past season due to severe monetary cuts imposed on the Garden by the City of New York. A gift of a friend of the Garden has enable these Japanese gardens to be again open to the public on Saturday, Sundays and holidays.


RICHARD SMITH AND PLANTS OF THE FIR TRIBE
