TAX LIT TWO PUBLISHED

An advance copy of <u>Taxonomic Literature</u>, second edition (TL-2), was presented to the Smithsonian Library, Department of Botany, by authors Frans A. Stafleu and Richard S. Cowan on November 19. Similar ceremonies were held in the libraries of the Institute for Systematic Botany in Utrecht, New York Botanical Garden and Missouri Botanical Garden.

"TL 2" is a selective guide to botanical publications and collections with dates commentaries and types. This much enlarged edition covers roughly 1753-1940, with authors A-G in the first volume. Published under the auspices of the International Association for Plant Taxonomy, every botanical library will find it indispensable for information on botanical explorers, collectors, and artists.
