Accommodations for 14th Annual Meeting

Considering these trying economic times, the Planning Committee has made very effort to keep expenses for attendees as moderate as possible. Therefore, we have selected a small hotel that is modest but clean and newly decorated, called the Washington Circle Inn. Well located for public transportation and cultural and dining facilities, it is only a few block from Georgetown and within walking distance of the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Registration forms are enclosed. These should be returned directly to the hotel before 15 May. We have been given special conference rates, with no requirement for a down payment. However, after 15 May rooms will be avialable on a space and rate availability basis only.

There are two classes of accommodations: Studio rooms are spacious, and each contains a double bed and a full-size, fold-out sofa bed, as well as a bath, kitchen and lunch table seating four. The cost is \$39.00 single occupancy, or \$49.00 double occupancy. Suites (referred to on registration card as "one bedroom") consist of a large living room and bedroom containing a king-size bed, or twin beds, and a sofa bed, also kitchen, table, and bath. Some are \$60.00 and some \$65.00 -- please specify which you would like. One particularly nice feature: included in the price of the room is Continental Breakfast each morning.

Rafinesque Symposium

For a symposium to be held in October 1983 commemorating the bicentennial of the birth of C. S. Rafinesque, Transylvania University invites proposed topics.

Especially welcome are papers on the neglected aspects of Rafinesque's career. Among these might be his place in 19th-century science; his interests in prehistory and ethnology; his work in linguistics, poetry, economics; the little-known five years not covered in his autobiography. Because taxonomy, especially in botany, was his lifelong preoccupation, papers on his contributions in the life sciences are also welcome, including his theories on biosystematics, and bibliographical studies of his technical publications.
