CBHL Member in Print

Bill Burk published two articles at the end of 2002. He wrote "Celebration Honors Pioneer Field Botanist Andre Michaux," Sida 20: 861-864. 2002, which includes a full-page photograph of Walter K. Taylor dressed in a period costume as Andre Michaux (also published in the CBHL *Newsletter*).

He also wrote a series of biographical sketches in *The Ohio Journal of Science*, volume 102. 2002: "Nany Ruth Clendenon (1933-2001)," pp. 132-133; "Margaret Hannah Fulford (1904-1999)," p. 133; "Francis James Jankowski (1922-2001)," p. 134; "Eugene Ernest Mihalyka (1917-1996)," p. 135; "Beatrice (Harger) Sellner (1907-2001)," pp. 135-136; and "Kenneth Albert Walsh (1922-1999)," p. 136.

Of special note to botanists and horticulturists would be the sketches of Margaret Fulford (Professor Emerita of Botany at the University of Cincinnati) and of Beatrice Sellner (teacher, ecologist, and conservationist whose father, Edgar Burton Harger was one of several people who founded the Connecticut Botanical Society in 1903).

In early fall 2002, Bill took a ten-day trip to Ann Arbor, Michigan where he conducted studies at the archives of the Bentley Historical Library at the University of Michigan. This work was completed in conjunction with his writing the first volume (1792-1902) of a history of botany at the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill.


Literature Review

Charles Bridgeman And The English Landscape Garden /

Peter Willis. Reprinted with supplementary plates and a catalogue of additional documents, drawings and attributions. Newcastle upon Tyne: Elysium Press Publishers, 2002. xxi, 441 p., [61] p. of plates. Includes bibliographical references (p. 187-216) and index. ISBN: 0-904712-04-4 \$225.00

This long out-of-print work has been magnificently reprinted with the important addition of supplementary plates and a



catalogue of documents, drawings and attributions. Many of the additional plans of Bridgeman's work are from the Gough Collection in the Bodleian Library, Oxford, the site of the largest single collection of his drawings.

Not familiar with the work of Bridgeman? "Charles Bridgeman

is the unsung pioneer in the establishment of *le jardin anglais*, that remarkable English invention which was to sweep eighteenth-century Europe. Bridgeman's role in the transition from the geometric layouts of the early 1700's to the freer designs of Capability Brown was a crucial one. His activities as Royal Gardener to George II and Queen Caroline embraced Hampton Court, Kensington Palace, and Richmond, whilst for private patrons he was active at Blenheim, Eastbury, Marble Hill, and a host of other country houses. A collaborator with Vanbrugh, Gibbs and Kent, and a friend of writers and artists, Bridgeman brought his work to a peak in the creation of Stowe in Buckinghamshire, the most celebrated landscape of the day."

The text and illustrations combine to create a comprehensive study of Bridgeman's life and commissions. This scholarly work includes a substantial bibliography and two indexes which make the presented research very accessible.

Owners of the 1977 edition will want to seriously consider purchasing this reprint. The additional illustrations of plans by Bridgeman will surely help students and scholars in their understanding of his work.

Examining a work such as this makes me just want to sigh! How fortunate we would be if such a comprehensive work existed for every important (or not-so-important) landscape architect, landscape designer, botanist, horticulturist, librarian...

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Conservation / Preservation

In this column I would like to introduce readers to the Canadian Conservation Institute (CCI) and review two of their recent publications. A quotation from a recent publication catalog will best describe CCI. "The Canadian Conservation Institute was created in 1972 to promote the proper care and preservation of Canada's cultural heritage and to advance the practice, science, and technology of conservation." In the past 30 years CCI has done an admirable job of fulfilling its mandate. Their staff has worked in close conjunction with conservators, curators, and conservation scientists in the US. Their publications are widely respected and used by US conservators. These publications are well-researched, clearly written, and inexpensive; many are routinely updated to reflect current practices and research. They are available in both English and French and many are available in Spanish.

Although CCI addresses all fields of conservation, their work covers specific areas important to librarians: care of collections, preventive conservation, museum and archive environments, care of paper, books, and photographs, and, of course, those unusual objects which somehow find their way into all of our collections. Their publications are useful (as well readable and understandable) to both the professional conservator and the layman responsible for the care of collections. CCI regularly publishes:

CCI Notes These leaflets range in length from 1-6 pages and offer practical advice on care, handling and storage of materials. There are currently 105 leaflets available. They can be purchased as a set or individually for \$2.00 each. Since they cover a wide range of subjects, CBHL members would probably want to order them individually to fit the needs of their specific libraries. In 2002, one CCI Note ("Precautions for Storage Areas") was updated and revised and 13 new ones were published.

Technical Bulletins Although the Technical Bulletins tend to be longer than the Notes, most are less than 20 pages in length. They each address a specific area of conservation and "provide detailed information of a specialized technical nature about selected conservation and care-of-collections topics." They include very useful illustrations and bibliographies and often have information about suppliers referred to in the text.

Other publications include proceedings of symposia and colloquia organized by CCI, research reports, and reports on miscellaneous products.

The following reviews are of recently published *CCI Technical Bulletins*.

Grattan, David, *The Stability of Photocopied and Laser-printed Documents and Images: General Guidelines*, TB #22, Canadian Conservation Institute, Department of Canadian Heritage, Ottawa, Canada, 2000.

This excellent 7-page publication clearly describes the issues of long-term stability of photocopied and laser-printed documents, which librarians must face as more and more documents in their collections are produced by these processes. Information includes paper permanence (often ignored in discussions of photocopies); how images are created; permanency of those images, as related to developer composition, image adhesion, and toner. A very useful section is a description of the "tape-peel" test with good photographic illustrations. Following these directions, you will be able to check how well your equipment functions in terms of image adhesion. The sections "Practical Recommendations" and "Preservation Concerns" summarize the issues to check and routinely keep in mind. The endnotes include useful information, as well as references to other publications on the subject.

Iraci, Joe, *Disaster Recovery of Modern Information Carriers: Compact Discs, Magnetic Tapes, and Magnetic Disks*, TB #25, Canadian Conservation Institute, Department of Canadian Heritage, Ottawa, Canada, 2002.

If your collections include any of the items listed in the title, you should have this publication AND READ IT CARE-FULLY. Information includes: Recovery from tap water or seawater immersion; recovery from dirty water immersion; removal of debris (dust, soot, etc.); removal of dry stubborn deposits; removal of mould, recovery from heat exposure, recovery from shock. In each section there is information relating to compact discs, magnetic tapes and magnetic disks. The illustrations (both photographic and drawings) are excellent and very clear. It is important to remember that, unlike paperbased materials (which can sometimes remain useable, although unsightly, after they have suffered from the disasters described), these modern carriers of information will often (almost always?) become partially or completely unreadable on your machinery if you do not carry out careful recovery procedures. The bibliography is quite lengthy and very useful.

More Plant Databases, Spices, Green Roofs and Food History

of the subject and its supposed benefits of reducing water runoff, reducing heating and

Apart from merely telling what is where with no further information, the database is frustrating to use owing to the large file responses on a slow server.

> The Tropical Plant Database www.raintree.com/plants.htm is actually a nutrition company's selective database of Amazon Basin plants with information on their chemical composition, and medical and ethnobotanical uses.

> Turning to online exhibits, the Medicinal Spices Exhibit unitproj.library.ucla.edu/ biomed/spice/index.cfm features pages devoted to specific spices combining modern photos with antique images accompanied by descriptions and discussions of the spice (often including the origin of its name), its medicinal properties, and a historical perspective provided by quotes from Robert Bentley and Henry Trimen's Medicinal Plants of 1880.

Although not strictly speaking botanical or horticultural, The Edible Monument www.getty.edu/research/tools/digital/ ediblemonument/ features an elaborate display of ornamental food and feasts from the past and the material used to create

them. The arch composed of bread, cheese, and suckling pigs is not to be missed. The exhibit is supplemented by a bibliography and links to food sites. One of these is BOOKS 2 EAT www.colophon.com/ ediblebooks featuring an annual festival of edible books or foods formed to fit a literary theme.

For those interested in more historic food sites, there is the Food Museum www.foodmuseum.com with illustrated pages relating the history of most things edible, including vegetables. In some cases the entries are large enough to form their own submuseums such as the Potato Museum www.foodmuseum.com/potato1.htm.

Finally, we conclude with Native Orchids of Canada www.rbg.ca/orchids, a site filled with images of these handsome native plants augmented by their descriptions, information on their location, specific habitat, and flowering season accompanied by appropriate reference citations.

PLANTS National Database plants.usda.gov is searchable by both common and scientific name, but can also generate data by utilizing a side menu of items such as advanced query, alternate crops, characteristics, checklists and sources, classification, culturally significant, etc. By contrast, the Hortiplex Database hortiplex.gardenweb.com/ plants has been set up on the Gardenweb site and contains information, images, ratings of plants and comments based on the experiences of site users, and links to other information including plant and seed vendors.

Names in Current Use - Genera www.bgbm.org/iapt/ncu/ genera/Default.htm is a searchable database generated from the word processing files used to create *NCU-3* in 1993. Species in Parks: Flora and Fauna Database ice.ucdavis.edu/ nps/ is a preliminary and rather bare bones database of the vascular plants and vertebrate animals found in the United States National Parks searchable by Park or species name.
